Municipal Notes

COUNCIL NEWS

We have quite the different look outside this time of year compared to last year. As we head into April, we hope to see more consistent spring weather and an end to this long winter. Mayor and Council would like to apologize for not having the Eagle River Rink up and running this year. The harsh winter conditions as well as lack of man power both played a role in not being able to have the rink available.

Mayor, Council, and our EDO welcomed Trevor Davis, Catherine, Dashnay, and Ray Boudreau from the Ministry of Northern Development, Mines, Natural Resources and Forestry to the municipal office at the end of March. We are happy to once again resume in-person meetings where we continue to discuss Machin projects with the Ministry and are excited to make some progress on projects such as the Ely Lake Cottage Lot Developments and our Cemetery Expansion.

On the 4th of March Mayor and Council had a virtual meeting with a Director of Policy and a Senior Manager from MMAH to discuss current Machin projects. Concerns were brought up regarding the costs of housing development and the red-tape in place that affects the Municipality. Both MMAH employees were thankful for hearing our concerns; they noted that every municipality is different and that it's important to hear our unique concerns.

We'd like to thank MP Eric Melillo for visiting Machin March 12th and supporting the Vermilion Bay Lions Club Pancake Breakfast. MP Melillo spent time discussing ongoing issues with Mayor Griffiths as well as advancements made on municipal projects.

Mayor and two council members will be travelling to Fort Frances to partake in the NOMA conference on April 27th, 28th, and 29th. This year's guestlist includes Minister Greg Rickford, Minister Steve Clark, Minister Sylvia Jones, Northern Ontario School of Medicine Dean Dr. Verma, and many other great speakers. These conferences are important for our Municipality as it gives our key stakeholders the opportunity to express concerns that are directly related to Machin.

On a final note, we have decided to wait and decide this month if we will open the municipal office back to the public. With COVID concerns stressed from the Northwestern Health Unit we feel it is the safest thing to do. We still encourage you to get a hold of a council member or municipal employee if you'd like to be present during a council meeting.

Mayors Check-In:

This month we took the time to sit down with Mayor Griffiths and discuss the current projects the Municipality is working on and the difficulties that accompany them. Mayor Griffiths had the following to say:

"I'm happy with the progress we've made on the many projects we're working on and look forward to their completion in the future. The CP property located on Spruce St is a property we've been trying to acquire since 2018; after working with council, we can finally say we've reached an agreement with CP and will have the land transaction finalized in the summer of this year. On another note, we've also begun mediation talks with CP over the 2018 Hanslip Road railway crossing bill that we refuse to pay. I'm aware of at least 6 other municipalities that have had to deal with an issue like this. However, since we were forced to sign a "gag order" we are not able to comment on the actual mediation.

On to good news. We seem to finally be making headway on the Ely Lake Cottage Lot Development project that was started back in 2005. The Ministry of NDMNRF has decided to use this as a pilot project in hopes of finding a way to streamline the disposition of Crown Land for cottage lot development. Although excited, we were still made aware the process can take 2-4 years because of bureaucratical red tape.

Council and I have also been working hard on trying to foster different development projects in the Municipality. We have recently purchased land in Vermilion Bay and are working on a development plan that will utilize the land and our Water Treatment Plant. We're also very eager about our Tourist Lot Subdivision application for the Vermilion Bay Airport that is being assessed by FedNor; because of bureaucratical regulations the cost of subdividing is extremely expensive and we require outside financial assistance to complete the project.

Municipal Notes cont'd

We continue to deal with red-tape regarding our municipal landfill sites but we are making headway for each landfill. At the beginning of this term our landfills were supposedly at capacity. However, after new studies it appears both sites have an extended useful life. The studies/tests that are required by the government to update each landfill capacity are expensive and something I believe shouldn't be subsidized by our taxpayers. We have let the Ministry of Environment, Conservation, and Parks know that we will not complete these required tests/ studies until we receive funding to cover the unincorporated portion to our landfills.

Finally, I'd like to thank municipal staff for their hard work through COVID. With many companies choosing to work from home, our staff still made it in everyday and followed COVID protocols as they continued to change."

As Mayor of the Municipality of Machin, Mayor Griffiths has found himself busy from the many online meetings and conferences that take place. There are numerous roles and activities that come with being mayor, for Mayor Griffiths, here are just a few: Chair of Finance, Member of the Safer Communities and Well-Being Committee, KDMA Director, and also being a member on the Northern Ontario Municipal Association's board.

Economic Development:

We have recently applied for two more grants, one through the Ontario Trillium Foundation and the other through the Ministry for Seniors and Accessibility. Both programs cover 100% of eligible costs and are key for our Municipality as we continue to progress. For the Ontario Trillium Foundation, we applied for the costs of having an art/crafts program once a month at both senior centres as well as a yoga class and art class once every other week at each senior centre. Through the MSA, the Municipality applied for the costs of installing a handicap accessible front door and a universal washroom in the municipal office. As per AODA standards and our Accessibility Plan, we have certain tasks we must complete in order to make our municipal office fully accessible.

Another website update - the developers are almost finished the design and content transfer for the new site. Once completed, Council and staff will approve of the look and begin the training process. We are optimistic we will have the site up and running at some point in April.

Machin's Clean-Up For Green-Up initiative is in support of the Municipalities strategic plan of "Beautification; how to make our community more pleasant to look at and live in". In 2018 and 2019 volunteers did an excellent job on the cleaning of our roads and highways in the Municipality resulting in a noticeable visual improvement along our roadways. Due to the pandemic, the last two years were cancelled, however we would like to commend the efforts of our residents that carried on this spring annual event on their own time, thank you!

Clean-up will be scheduled on Saturday May 7th (alternate weather day Saturday May 14th). The Municipality will supply garbage bags for Municipal roads and Emcon Services Inc. will supply bags for Numbered Highways 17, 105, 594, 647.

WHEN: Saturday May 7th (alternate weather day Saturday May 14th)

WHERE: Open to all roads and Highways within the Municipality of Machin

HOW: Sign-up/Contact sheet, Safety flyer and Garbage bags can be picked up at the Municipal Office from

Monday May 2^{nd} to Friday the 6^{th} during regular office hours 8 a.m. - 4 p.m., as well on Saturday May 7^{th} from 8 a.m. - 1 p.m. at volunteer tables setup at the Vermilion Bay Fire Hall and Eagle River Fire Hall. At the same locations pick-up a Safety Flyer with safety tips to help keep us safe while

participating in this volunteer initiative.

Pick-up garbage bags (supplied by the Municipality) for municipal roads (black bags for garbage & clear bags for recycle material). Heavy black bags are supplied by Emcon for cleaning numbered highways (please limit # of bags you take based on what you will fill)

For volunteers who plan to participate but may not need supplies from the pick-up locations we ask that you contact the Municipal Office ph. 227-2633 or email at deputyclerk@visitmachin.com so we can get a better account of how many are participating.

MORE INFORMATION:

The Municipality has granted permission to bring these bags to the landfill with no charge. Volunteers can drop their bags off at the Municipal Landfills that are open or leave them on the road edges for pickup by volunteers or the Public Works Department. Emcon will pick-up along the numbered highways (heavy black bags).

MACHIN'S CLEAN-UP FOR GREEN-UP 2022

(HOW CON'T)

We encourage volunteers to recycle where possible to help extend the life of our landfills (clear bags). Crush recycle material as much as possible to optimize Blue Box space at the landfills. Clear bags containing recycle material can be deposited directing into the recycle bins at the landfills, any black bags containing recycle material must be emptied into the recycle bins. Where possible separate aluminum pop and beer tins, and beer bottles for a possible refund deposit that can be donated to a local cause (If volunteers feel safe doing so)

Please make sure your bags are visible along the roads but well off the road to make sure they are not impeding the flow of traffic

If your bags are not picked up by Tuesday May 10^{th,} please contact the Municipal Office to ensure they are removed.



Frozen Water Services Information for Property Owners Whose Responsibility is it?



Under the Ontario Building Code, all the water service lines in your building, and the Property Owner Water Service Line, which extends into your building, are defined as "plumbing".

Legally, the Municipality only has jurisdiction and responsibility for the "Water Distribution System", which is defined under Ontario Regulation 170/03 — Drinking Water Systems, as including the water mains, appurtenances (i.e. fire hydrants, valves, sampling stations) and "service connections". Only the line from the water main, up to and including the curb stop is the municipality responsibility. The property owner is responsible from the curb stop up to and including the plumbing in the house.

Property Owners in Vermilion Bay with Aqua Flow units are reminded to turn them on to prevent your water from freezing.

This is a Door to Door Service – you do not have to worry about parking or walking. We drop you off right at the door of your medical appointment or essential shopping and return to pick you up.

The cost is \$10.00 per person to ride to and from Dryden on Tuesday or Thursday. You do not have to be a senior to use this service. Any adult can ride, however seniors do come first for this service.



Fire Season Starts April 1st – ALL Outdoor Fires MUST Follow MNR Regulations Call 310-FIRE (310-3473) to Report a Forest Fire

Rules that MUST be followed:

Ignite the fire no sooner than 2 hours before sunset and extinguish it no later than 2 hours after sunrise

Conditions allow fire to burn safely until extinguished

You take all necessary steps to tend, control and extinguish the fire

Do not have an open fire in a restricted fire zone

The only material that can be burnt is:

- grass
- wood
- brush

wood by-product

Using an incinerator:

- ensure the incinerator is an enclosed device constructed entirely of non-combustible material
- cover the incinerator with a screen having a mesh size of not more than 5 millimetres
- keep the incinerator at least 5 metres from any forest area
- keep the incinerator at least 2 metres from any flammable material

Safe outdoor burning tips:

Keep your fire small

- keep burning pile less than 2 metres in diameter and less than 2 metres high
- an area of grass or leaves can be burned if the area is less than one hectare (2.5 acres) and the length of the flaming edge is kept to less than 30 metres (100 feet)

Choose a safe site

- keep burning piles at least 2 metres from other flammable material so the fire doesn't escape by running along the ground away from the pile or burn area
- if burning an area of grass or leaves, make sure the area is surrounded by a fire-proof boundary, such as a road, wet ditch or ploughed ground

Stay with your fire

- you must tend the fire, keep it under control, and extinguish it before leaving the site
- a responsible person must be present to tend the fire at all times, even if it is contained in an incinerator
- keep adequate tools and water on hand to control the fire if it begins to spread

Put the fire out – since coals can smoulder for hours and hot embers and sparks can be blown by the wind:

- dispose of used charcoal or ashes in a pit
- drown hot coals thoroughly, stir them and drown them again until cold

If you start a fire, you are responsible for putting it out. MNR can fine you and hold you responsible for the cost of putting out the fire and for any property damage.



Boomerang Bags at the Vermilion Bay Co-Op. Yehhhh!!!

We have been suffocating ourselves in a toxic sea of plastic up until now.

Plastic production has reached a whopping 400 million metric tonnes globally each year. If trends continue as expected, plastic will account for 20% of total oil consumption by 2050 not to mention the devastating problems it has created in our oceans.

But Hey, Boomerang Bags will arrive soon at the Vermilion Bay Co-op Yehhhh!!

Boomerang Bags is a grassroots movement to help divert waste from landfill. So far 522,361 bags have been made diverting 182,826 kg of waste from landfill.

Marg Aitken had the idea to bring Boomerang Bags to our communities and organized the Sew Sustainable Sewing Bee along with Helen Grymaloski and the Vermilion Bay Lions Club.

Twenty women from five communities in Northwest Ontario got together March 26 at the Vermilion Bay Lion's Hall to sew shopping bags, Boomerang Bags, from recycled and post-consumer waste fabric. Their efforts at The Sew Sustainable Sewing Bee produced 60 shopping bags some of which will be available for use at the Vermilion Bay Co-Op. These bags are offered free to those who forgot to bring their own cloth bags to shop with. They are meant to be shared around and brought back to the store for others to use hence the name Boomerang.




