Municipal Notes

COUNCIL NEWS

Mayor and Council would like to thank Minister Rickford and his staff for organizing a trip to Machin to announce funding from the Northern Ontario Heritage Fund Corporation for the Woodland Arena. After completing Phase 1 and 2 of the grant process, we were thrilled to learn that our project was approved. With 90% of the costs being funded by NOHFC, we will be completing upgrades at the Woodland Arena to help save on future costs and expand the useful life of the ice plant. One of these upgrades includes the installation of a REALice water system; a new, innovative way to make ice that eliminates the need for hot water, resulting in cost savings each year.

Part of the 2021 Census has been released. Machin saw a slight growth where other municipalities in Northwestern Ontario experienced some slight declines. In total, Machin's population increased from 971 to 1,012 (4.2% increase).

Not all residents may be aware that KDSB has announced they are expanding their EMS Paramedic Service In doing so, they will be working with Council and staff to build a new EMS base in the community. We look forward to the completion of this project and what it will bring to our community.

Department budgets are currently being finalized. Once completed they will be given to Council for their review. With many grants still pending approval, as well as new projects in the works, we are expecting to have a very busy year.

Mayor Griffiths is working with other executives and board members at the Northern Ontario Municipalities Association to complete their upcoming strategic plan. Mayor Griffiths continues to advocate for increased funding and improved support for smaller municipalities like ourselves.

Finally, Mayor and Council would like to extend a big thank you to Public Works for their efforts this year. So far, we have experienced a lot of heavy snowfall, more than we are accustomed to, and Public Works has spent many long hours working on snow removal so residents can reach their destinations safely.

Economic Development:

I'm happy to say that we were approved for our application to the Municipal Modernization Program Intake 3. This program is directed at modernizing our Municipal services to improve on efficiencies, save costs, and eliminate any low value work that is not beneficial to taxpayers. A portion of this funding will be used towards the costs associated with our new website development as well as the training and yearly upkeep for the site. The other portion will be used towards the costs of having a member from BDO Global come to the Municipality and implement the new service delivery models.

The Municipality recently applied to the Northern Ontario Development Program offered through FedNor for funding that would cover 90% of the costs to carry out a feasibility study for Ely Lake. After many attempts in the past to acquire cottage lots on Ely Lake from the MNDMNRF, we are optimistic that the completion of this feasibility study will be a major step forward in the process. Once completed, the Ministry can use the information to assess how many cottage lots can be supported on Ely Lake.


Reminder: Dog Tag Renewal is March 31, 2022 at a cost of \$10.00 per dog.

Need a Ride to Dryden?

Try Out Our Seniors Bus.

This is a Door to Door Service – you do not have to worry about parking or walking. We drop you off right at the door of your medical appointment or essential shopping and return to pick you up.

The cost is **\$10.00 per person** to ride to and from Dryden on Tuesday or Thursday. Should you have mobility issues both getting on and off the bus or shopping and carrying your items, you will have to bring along a companion.

Please call the Municipal Office at 227-2633 to book your ride or if you have any questions.

You do not have to be a senior to use this service. Any adult can ride, however seniors do come first for this service.

Covid-19 restrictions apply: Masks are mandatory, along with social distancing, and hand sanitizing on the bus. The Driver will explain this to you upon pick up.





Time to change clocks ahead is also a good time to install new batteries in all smoke and carbon monoxide alarms.

Only working smoke alarms and carbon monoxide alarms can do their job and help save your life. In order to ensure your smoke alarms and CO alarms are working properly, the batteries should be replaced yearly and they should be checked, tested and dusted/vacuumed monthly or according to manufacturer's instructions. If a smoke and/or CO alarm fails to pass the test, has been painted or otherwise contaminated, or if you have any doubt regarding its working condition, it needs to be replaced. Smoke alarms and CO alarms also have a limited life, usually 10 years from manufacturer's date, and need to be replaced before they expire.

Smoke alarms – required on every storey of the home and outside all sleeping areas. For added protection, it is recommended to also install smoke alarms inside all bedrooms.

Carbon monoxide alarms – required outside all sleeping areas, if your home has a fuel-burning appliance, fireplace or attached garage. For added protection, it is recommended to also install CO alarms on every storey of home.

Always install the alarms according to manufacturer's instructions. Both smoke and CO alarms usually have a low battery alarm and an end-of-life alarm in addition to the emergency warning alarm. Consult the manufacturer's instructions to know the difference between the different alarm sounds.

When there is a fire, a quick escape is critical. Working smoke alarms and everyone knowing how to respond when they hear the alarm is essential due to how rapidly smoke and fire spread. The best way to ensure everyone knows what to do when they hear the smoke alarm is by having and practicing a home fire escape plan. The home fire escape plan should be tailored to the people in your household and include a meeting place outside. Since every second counts, always keep all exits easily accessible and windows able to open freely. For windows that are higher off the ground, consider purchasing collapsible emergency escape ladders.

To reduce the risk of carbon monoxide build-up, keep chimneys and intake/exhaust vents for furnaces and heating appliances free of debris, ice and snow accumulations; only burn dry, well-seasoned wood in fireplaces and woodstoves; and open the flu before using a fireplace for adequate ventilation. Never use barbeques inside garages and never run a vehicle or other fueled engine or motor inside a garage, even if the garage doors are open. Always remove a vehicle from the garage immediately after starting it.

If your CO alarm sounds, and you or other occupants are suffering from symptoms of CO poisoning (flulike symptoms without a fever, headache, nausea, dizziness, confusion, drowsiness and/or loss of consciousness) get everyone out of the home immediately.

If a fire or carbon monoxide emergency occurs, don't delay, always get out quick and stay out!! Quickly gather at your designated meeting place and then call 911 from outside the home.



What you should know about colon cancer screening

What is colon cancer?

Colon cancer is cancer of the colon (lower part of the digestive system) or rectum (the last 6 inches of the colon). It is also known as colorectal cancer or bowel cancer. It is one of the most common cancers people die from in Ontario. However, when colon cancer is caught early, 9 out of 10 people with the disease can be cured.

What is cancer screening?

Cancer screening (getting checked for cancer) is testing done on people who are at risk of getting cancer but have no symptoms and generally feel fine.

ColonCancerCheck is a screening program in Ontario that encourages people who are at risk of getting colon cancer to get screened regularly for the disease.

Who should get screened for colon cancer?

ColonCancerCheck screens 2 groups of eligible people: those at average risk of getting colon cancer and those at increased risk of getting colon cancer.


Average risk: People who are 50 to 74 years old and have had no parents, brothers, sisters or children (first-degree relatives) with colon cancer.

If you are at average risk, you should get screened with a **fecal immunochemical test (FIT)** every 2 years starting at age 50.

Increased risk: People who have had 1 or more parents, brothers, sisters or children (first-degree relatives) with colon cancer.

If you are at increased risk, you should get screened with a colonoscopy starting at age 50, or 10 years earlier than the age your first-degree relative was diagnosed with colon cancer, whichever comes first. How often you get screened depends on the age your first-degree relative was diagnosed.

Talk to your family doctor or nurse practitioner about getting screened



How do I get a FIT?

Talk to your family doctor or nurse practitioner to find out if a FIT is right for you.

If you do not have a family doctor or nurse practitioner, you can get a FIT by calling Telehealth Ontario at 1-866-828-9213.

If you live in a First Nation community, you can contact your health centre or nursing station for more information.



Happy St. Patrick's Day – Color Me

Hello Machin and surrounding area.

It has been a while.

I've been looking at the moon a lot these nights. Many of you may know February's moon is often referred to as the Full Snow Moon. But also known to some as the Hunger Moon or the Bone Moon or the Little Famine Moon. As the names suggest, this time of year has always been associated with hard times. This year with the snow and biting temperature, it's harder than usual for some.

Knowing that for many, many, many moons (pun totally intended) people have found this time of year hard may help to normalize how you may be feeling right now... scarce, depleted, uncertain of how much longer you can stand this. And as the name's that people have given the moon suggest, this isn't a new feeling or even a wrong feeling. But it is uncomfortable. And not one I hope sticks around.

Lucky for us, we have the ability to imagine or remember beyond the present moment. Imagine the snow melting, remember the summer sun. We have brains that allow us to assess a situation and make choices (call a friend even if we don't feel like it) or take actions (bundle up and take a brisk walk or even just turn your face to the sun for a moment), choices and actions that help us spread our attention beyond the present, to healthier, happier times. But sometimes the motivation just is not there....

Two tricks I have used to move myself through unmotivated times are: "Take 10" and "imagine the pleasure." Take 10 means tell yourself you'll do it for "just 10 minutes", 10 minutes is a manageable time (ie. Just a 10 minute walk, just 10 minutes of cleaning the kitchen, just 10 minutes of sitting on the floor to play with a child, just a 10 minute phone call, just 10 minutes of undistracted time with your spouse). Convincing yourself to do 10 minutes instead of imagining 40 minutes is way easier. And sometimes when you're doing something for 10 minutes you actually end up enjoying it and doing it longer. "Imagine the pleasure" is visualizing the part of the action you know you will enjoy while moving through the part you don't. For example, I am small. Tiny bones; this cold weather is killing me. I'm cold to begin with. So the thought of going outside immediately makes me experience discomfort; my whole body tenses up, my thoughts say "not a chance" and my choice and action is to not go for a walk and turn around and walk right back upstairs away from the door. However, I know that once I am out and walking I enjoy it. Even if just for 10 minutes, I feel better. So I've learned to picture myself already bundled up in my warmest clothes and enjoying my walk, and I hold that thought in my mind while I put on my boots and coat and walk out the

door. The pleasure pulls me through the pain. Doesn't work all the time, but it does work sometimes. Sometimes I have to take a hot shower which changes my body temperature and then I'm starting out warm. And if I do both: change my body temperature and use the above mental strategies, even greater chance of success!

Give it a try. Apply it to something you know is good for you but you've been avoiding or have no motivation to do. If it doesn't work, try again. And again.

Stay warm and remember, there's a Full Strawberry Moon coming in June (or a Honey Moon to some). Hold onto that thought and move through this winter.

Charn, Zane and Zoe created this pink and red tree, Hearts, sweet stuffies and emoji's for all to see




Debbie created this 'heartfelt' delight. And yes, it does light up at night.
